The influenza vaccine does not make you sick

You've probably heard season) this before from friends or family: "I don't get a flu shot because it makes me sick."

This is a myth. The reality is that the flu vaccine cannot make you sick.

"The viruses in the flu vaccine are dead or 'inactivated' and cannot be infectious or cause illness," said Wilma Wooten, M.D., M.P.H., County public health officer. "The most common side effects from the flu shot are soreness, redness, or swelling where the shot was given."

Wooten explained that some people may experience a low-grade fever, headache and muscle aches which would lead them to think they got sick. If these reactions occur, they usually begin after getting vaccinated and last 1-2 days.

"When this happens, the reactions are considerably milder and less severe that the symptoms caused by the flu which can last up to two weeks," Wooten explained. "Get vaccinated now before the flu starts to spread. For the week ending Oct. 21, 2017, the Health and Human Services Agency Influenza Watch report shows the following: depart-Emergency ment visits for influenza-like illness: 1 percent of all visits (the same as the previous week) Lab-confirmed influenza cases for the week: 27 (down from 37 the previous week) Total influenza deaths to date: 1 (compared to 1 at this time last season) Total lab-confirmed influenza cases to date: 285 (compared to 89 last

Your Best Shot Against the Flu

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that everyone 6 months and older get a flu shot every year. The vaccine is safe and effective. It takes two weeks for immunity to develop.

Vaccination is especially important for people who are at high risk of developing serious complications from influenza. They include: • People with chronic medical conditions like asthma, diabetes and lung disease, even if symptoms are under control

- Pregnant women
- People 65 years and older
- People who live with or care for others who are at higher risk
- · In addition to getting vaccinated, people should also do the following to avoid getting sick:
- Wash hands thorough-

Whatever you may think about your handwriting, most peoples' handwriting is hard to read. Especially when they are writing their own names, which they have been doing all their lives, so they have no idea how illegible they have become.

• When you submit items, whether in person, or by email, put your name in there somewhere, along with contact info, preferably both email and phone. It's very important to know whom we are talking to. These numbers will not be used in the article, but if we have a question, we will need to contact you ASAP. For email, use editor(a) valleycenter.com. • When you send us items by email, PLEASE put a subject in the email. Emails can and will be ignored without a subject. • We love photos! Photos make an article "pop" with interest. Try to focus on the people in your photo instead of the "thing." And if you think you are too close to your subjects-get closer! On the technical side of things, we prefer

jpgs, preferably 300 dpi. If you don't know what any of that means, don't worry about it. We'll figure it out together.

• Please don't submit photos imbedded in documents—something that is increasingly common as people become more sophisticated with their submissions. This actually makes things HARDER for us. We prefer you to send the documents and photos as separate.

• Our deadline for most items to the paper is Friday, 5 p.m. for the next issue. Obviously, this doesn't apply to things that happen over the weekend.

• Whatever you do, don't start an article with "It's that time of year again!" It may very well be that time of year again, and probably is, but that is probably the most trite way possible to begin a communication. Worse, it communicates absolutely nothing in terms of information. The editor will hit his head against the wall until he falls down unconscious if you use it. You wouldn't want to be responsible for that happening, would you?
